# • Advocate for a Florida or National Carbon Fee/Dividend Policy. 10 2 13 Notes from Meeting on Sunday, April 5

#### Welcome & Orientation

We opened with the words of Rev. Russell Meyer of the Florida Council of Churches describing the inspiration for the Florida Interfaith Climate Change Conference, April 10-11 at Northland Church in Longwood, FL (Greater Orlando area):

"I've come to see that the spiritual work for our generation shifts the narrative dramatically. Here in Florida, the public policy narrative owes everything to the ideology of commodification. It's all about buying and selling property and experience. The role of government is cast only as a structural support for commerce. Yet we all know that the most meaningful things in our lives are priceless—the joy of a child's smile or the touch of a loved one or the wonder of sunrise or the beauty of a poem, these are not mere things to be bought and sold. The truth is that we are relational beings, and the narratives of relationships are what give our lives meaning, hope and purpose."

We discussed our goal of presenting a recommended set of commitments to the church Board of Trustees for approval at the May or June meeting, committing to at least one action in each of the Commit2Respond pillars: Shift to a low carbon future; Advance the human rights of affected communities; Grow the climate justice movement.

Reviewing Possible Actions: Congregational Dot Voting and Volunteer Commitments to Organize and Implement (See Congregational Reeting Results chart above).

Here were our takeaways:

- There was clear consensus around the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> choice actions in each pillar, expressed consistently through the dot voting exercise, the earlier survey of "Climateers", and the number of people offering to help organize and implement. Two broader themes also emerged across pillars as shown in the table below: Transitioning toward healthier sustainable eating patterns, and promoting renewable energy.
- While there was less interest in some of the other actions, there were volunteers
  who expressed interest in organizing or implementing those. The consensus in
  the Task Force was that while we should focus on the two broad themes and first
  and second choice actions listed below for our collective efforts, we should also
  welcome the leadership of others who are energized to organize any of the other
  actions. For example, four people indicated interest in leading a

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multigenerational Religious Education program on climate justice for children and youth.

The Task Force consensus was to:

• Invite someone from each group of "action organizers" to volunteer to be the convener of that "Action Task Force" (e.g. Transition to Healthier eating) for purposes of planning the action and finalizing the recommendation to the Board. The Action Task Force will be asked to identify any congregation resources that might be required (e.g. money, support of other church Committees, etc.) and "shop" their recommendation with those who might need to know. Brock will

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send notes to each of the six action groups above this week explaining the role and soliciting a volunteer convener. If that doesn't work, he'll start dialing.

- Rename the Commit2Respond Task Force as the "Commit2Respond Steering Committee" and ask the conveners of each "Action Task Force" to serve on the steering Committee so we can compare notes.
- We thought it was more reasonable to shoot to make commitment recommendations at the June Board meeting, Tuesday, June 16 at 7 pm.
- The next Commit2Respond Steering Committee meeting will be Sunday, April 26 at 9:30 am in the Library.
